1- Most nouns add *-s* in the plural.


doctor — doctors

2- Nouns that end in *-s*, *-ss*, *-sh*, or *-ch* add *-es*.

bus → buses class → classes sandwich → sandwiches 3- Some nouns that end in -y change to *-ies*.
